

Foster Parent Training

- 1. Child welfare has changed
 - a. More and more birth parents are given deference regarding the children.
 - b. When birth parents complain it is less apt to be treated as a nuisance.
 - c. When birth parents complain the complaint goes to CPS for investigation.
 - d. When there is a CPS investigation there is usually a CCL investigation that follows.
- 2. In order to avoid these investigations we are going to be more vigilant regarding the care and appearance of the children.
- 3. Prior to the visit you must:
 - a. Prepare the care form. Submit copy to your social worker and a copy to the birth parent.
 - b. Note any minor scratches, bruises etc.
 - c. Bath the child.
 - d. Put child into fresh clothes.
 - i. Use new cloths or cloths birth parent has bought. Sunday Bests.
 - e. Do the child's hair.
 - f. Send child to visit with gifts, crafts and pictures for the birth parent.
- 4. Posture toward the birth parent.
 - a. Take the posture of an employee. Employed by the birth parent.
 - b. Forget that their children were removed from them.
 - c. They are now the most caring. Loving and vigilant parents that have ever existed.
 - d. They are going to assess every scratch and every hair.
 - e. They are looking for something to complain about.
- 5. Build a relationship with the birth parent.
 - a. Talk with the birth parent and ask them how you can best care for their child and meet their needs.
 - b. If they ask you for ANYTHING you do it.
 - i. Diapers
 - ii. Feeding
 - iii. Clothes
 - c. If they ask for anything that is completely unreasonable.
 - i. Tell them you will have to check with the SW.
 - ii. SW is always the bad guy.
 - iii. You are always the humble employed ally trying to serve their every need.
- 6. There are service aides now completing a lot of supervised visitation.
 - a. These aides are not trained of equipped to deal with problems.
 - b. IF there is a problem they are just bumping it over to the phone room.
 - c. You must be ready to meet these problems.
 - d. Tell your social worker what is happening and they will work on it.
- 7. Remember, the children you are caring for are not your own.
 - a. There is a higher level of vigilance that is required
